Go behind the apparent circumstances of the situation and locate the love in yourself and in all others involved in the situation ~ Mother Teresa Hola Selena,

I want to thank you for the guidance you gave me in maneuvering the emergency shelter system at York College in order to identify families who receive services at my agency. I want to report that my experience at York College yesterday was overwhelming positive. I along with four coworkers went to the College to attempt to locate families displaced by the hurricane. The minute we walked in the doors the York staff and volunteers were very welcoming and directed us to the intake desk where we discussed our situation with the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) representative. I must have provided the OEM representative with at least six different lists (more than 30 names each) which she so graciously reviewed name by name. We showed our identification and were given permission to walk around the area where families were located in the attempt to assess their need for social services. I really loved how clean and orderly all the sections were. I was especially moved when I saw a section for animals. As a pet lover, I totally understand that animals, for many, are family and for York to meet that need has been so great. It was even more overwhelming when I noticed that there was a van service taking families to vote! The van said "Ride to Vote." How amazing to think that in the midst of this tragedy individuals were still concerned about the election!

Memories also came to me when we worked 911 together. Remember all that was done for the people of this city during that time? Thank you so much for your ongoing mentoring!!!


#### Self-Care:

## Hot Off The Press Field Education Manual 2012-2013




The Field Education Manual 2012-2013 has been prepared to comply with The Council on Social Work Education (CSWE, the Council) 2008 Educational Policy Accreditation Standards (EPAS) (updated 2012), York College Social Work Program's mission, goals, and vision to move students forward into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. Many thanks to those who shared experiences and skills that are organic to the social work profession, and for helping to transform the Field Education Manual 2012-2013 (the Manual).

Do what has changed in the Field Education Manual 2012-2013? First, change relates to the

Core Competencies. The CSWE asserts that competencies are measurable practice behaviors that comprise knowledge, values, and skills essential for integration and application in practice at the microlevel, mezzolevel, and marcolevel (CSWE, 2012). Second, the layout of the Manual has been changed to reflect current York College and the Social Work Program's policies and procedures. Third, implementation of grading rubrics, up-to-date evidenced-based material, and modification of course syllabi are transformed. Fourth, the Office of Field Education has established a comprehensive assessment plan that is consistent with York College's Outcomes Assessment Plan (2012) and Social Work Program's newly developed assessment design and is aimed to institute course Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) throughout explicit curriculum. Fifth, Field Education has gone viral. In a rapidly technological world of social media and greater demands to communicate via cyberspace, the Office of Field Education has embraced effective approaches to deliver critical information to students and community partners. Students are engaged in collaborative blackboard discussions and online office hours. The York College Social Work Field Education Signature Pedagogy E-Newsletter has been created to share relevant information about field education, the Program, and trends in the Profession with local and global constituents. The vision for the Office of Field Education includes further integration of technology to include webinars and a web-site that stores the Field Education Manual, forms, and other relevant information, and routine sharing of assessment outcomes and updates.

#### Moving Towards EPAS 2008 Assessment Compliance in Social Work Field Education...The Signature Pedagogy



On Wednesday, October 17, 2012 & November 14, 2012, Director of Field Education Dr. Selena T. Rodgers trained 20 Field Instructors, Seminar Instructors and Field Advisory Council members on CSWE assessment forms. Consistent with the York College Assessment Plan <u>https://</u><u>www.york.cuny.edu/faculty-staff/assessment/assessment-plan-ii-2009-2012/view</u> the Social Work Program newly developed assessment design aims to institute course Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) throughout explicit curriculum. The training provided practitioners who accept the field instruction role with knowledge and skills to use Educational Policy Accreditation Standards (EPAS) 2008 compliance assessment tools with students. Specifically, the Office of Field Education has established a comprehensive assessment plan for field instruction which entails a description of multiple measures, benchmarks and compliance with CSWE competencies and practice behaviors.

Training seminars opened with light refreshments (supported by York College Auxiliary Fund) and a brief movie based on Dr. Spencer Johnson's bestseller, 'Who Moved My Cheese''. "Who Moved My Cheese? is the story of four characters living in a "Maze" who face unexpected change when they discover their "Cheese" has disappeared. Sniff and Scurry, are mice, and Hem and Haw, are little people the size of mice. Each adapt to change in their "Maze" differently.' After reviewing the movie, participants engaged in an activity that promoted discussion about new assessment forms. The interactive dialogue continued with the Field Director offering a detailed review of EPAS and facts about assessment forms. As stakeholders participants were invited to offer feedback about assessment forms. Their feedback was an essential part of the assessment process and offered a segue for the Field Director to help move the Signature Pedagogy at York College forward. Overwhelmingly, participants reported that the training seminars were, "very helpful".

#### Student Liability Insurance

Ch November 27, 2012, the Office of Field Education received 51 applications from students seeking to begin Field Placement in Spring 2013. On December 5, 2012, students will receive a copy of the Field Education Manual 2012-2013 during the mandatory student orientation. Included in the updated manual is the policy on Social Work Liability Insurance. Prior to the beginning of the practicum, students are required to provide evidence that they have purchased liability insurance that provides appropriate coverage of any claims that might be entered against them in the discharge of their professional responsibilities during their student internship. National Association of Social Workers (NASW) provides a reasonably priced policy for individual students. In Summer 2012, Social Work Field Directors (l to r), Lucy Lawrence (Warren Wilson College, Asheville, NC), Jodi K. Hall (North Carolina State University, Raleigh, NC), Ruth Gerritsen-McKane (University of Utah, Salt Lake City, UT), Selena T. Rodgers (York College of The City University of New York, Jamaica, NY) and Aneesha Bharwani (Metropolitan State College of Denver, CO) joined the first CSWE-sponsored delegation of academic social workers to Havana, Cuba. Among places visited by the 21-member delegation were: The University of Havana, Casa Cultural of Playa Municipality, Las Terrazas, and Casa Comunitaria of the Martin Luther King Center. The delegation engaged in meaningful conversations with Cuban academics, researchers, economist, students, community members, staff, and leaders.

#### Docial Work Field Education Director and Cuba delegation member,

Dr. Selena T. Rodgers, summarized her journey to Cuba below. Professor Rodgers' interests in traveling to Cuba include, research interests regarding Afro-Cuban women's experiences, learning about Cuban social work education, study abroad and networking opportunities. The visit to Casa Cultural of Playa Municipality included interactions with older adults who are young in spirit and "aging in place" with a sense of dignity and well being. The meeting with Sociology and Social Work Faculty, and students at University of Havana, was very informative. They spoke about the history of Social Work in Cuba, social work practice, and the different social work programs. The visit to Casa Comunitaria of the Martin Luther King Center (the House), La Lisa municipality provided a authentic Afro-Cuban experience-"oneness" and "spirituality." The Babalu (High Priest), Casa director, community members, medical staff, and individuals from the neighborhood passionately shared their roles and contributions to the House. Of particular interest was the hair salon initiative, an economic and empowerment project for Afro-Cuban women. It was an honor for Dr. Rodgers to demonstrate a "how to" head wrapping for several community members. The encounter with Odalys González Jubán, President of the Cuban Society of Social Workers in Health Care, was amazing. She shared her extensive knowledge about the challenges and benefits of Cuban health care. In closing, "Much of what I have discovered about Cuba, the people, the culture, the history and social work education has left a positive imprint on my life's journey and helped forward my professional agenda. "I was fortunate to meet some dynamic American and Cuban colleagues who are making extraordinary contributions to the global community and social work profession." Future endeavors include collaborating with Commissioners of CSWE Commission on Global Education, Professor Emeritus David Strug (Wurzweiler School of Social Work/Yeshiva University), Dr. Vadim Moldovan (York College CUNY), and American and International colleagues" said Rodgers

#### A Message From the Field Director

"Gocial Work Matters"! The Council on Social Work Education (2010) asserts that field education represents the central form of instruction and learning in which a profession socializes its students to perform the role of practitioner. The Council also contends that Field Education is the "Signature Pedagogy" of social work education (Council of Social Work Education, 2010). The Office of Field Education, a cornerstone of the Social Work Program, is housed within the Department of Social Sciences, School of Health and Behavioral Sciences at York College of The City University of New York.

" Gocial Work Matters"! The first accreditation of the York College Social Work Program by the

Council on Social Work Education was in 1985. Dr. Alma Norment (Former Field Education Director (1985 to 1986 & 1996 to 2003) helped lay the foundation for the Office of Field Education at York College. In 1996, Dr. Norment and my mentor, Dr. Tricia Bent-Goodley (a former part-time professor at York) entrusted me to supervise my first social work student. What resonates with me is the wide range of support received by Dr. Norment and Dr. Bent-Goodley. It was clear to me then and now that their leadership nurtured my journey to York College. Fast forward 6,205+ days (or 17+ years) later to May 2012 — it's springtime again — a season of renewal, re-growth, and rebirth. I was chosen to serve as York's Field Education Director. As I stand on the shoulders of Dr. Alma Norment's legacy and commitment to the cause of field education and service, I'm reminded that this journey is not by chance. An update on my first social work student supervisee: She's is a mommy-to-be, York Alumnae, MSW graduate of Penn State University, and a supervisor for social work students.

Keynote Speaker Dr. Alma C. Jones Norment



Dr. Norment joined the Social Sciences Department at York College in September, 1985, on a one year appointment. During the 1985-1986 Terms, Dr. Norment assumed administrative responsibility for the Field Education Program and taught courses related to Field Education. In September, 1987, Dr. Norment was Appointed to a position as Assistant Professor of Social Work and was awarded tenure in 1992. In November, 1989, Dr. Norment was appointed Director, Social Work Program, a position she maintained until her resignation in June, 1995. Dr. Norment returned to her roots as Director of Field Education until her retirement from York College in 2003.

Dr. Norment taught many courses in the Social Work curriculum from 1987 to 1989, including a course concerning group intervention which lead to a paper entitled, "Teaching Culturally Diverse Students Generalist Practice Using Group Method and Autobiography", published by the Bacca-laureate Programs Directors (BPD) Forum — Selected Papers. Dr. Norment was the Project Director for CUNY REACH research project from January 1993 to June 1996 — a workforce development program implemented into the participating CUNY Colleges including York College. This resulted in former public assistance recipients earning college degrees and some masters degrees in Social Work.

Dr. Norment earned her Bachelor's degree in Sociology from LeMoyne College in Memphis, Tennessee and her Masters Degree from The University of Tennessee in Nashville, TN. Dr. Norment earned her Doctor of Social Work Degree at Columbia University School of Social Work, New York, New York in 1988.

Dr. Norment's Professional career began as a mental health clinician with the Veteran's Administration Psychiatric Hospitals in Illinois, California and New York City. She was the Director of the Community Health Clinic of the then, Meadowbrook Hospital in East Meadow, New York, and the Director of Social Work at Pilgrim Psychiatric Center in Brentwood, New York, from 1970 to 1976. Dr. Norment was appointed to an Assistant Professor of social Work position at SUNY at Stony Brook School of Social Work from 1976 to 1980. While at Stony Brook, Dr. Norment was Director of the Intervention Program.

Ch Wednesday, May 23, 2012 I had the privilege and honor of attending the "Social Work Matters" Special Brunch. It was such an inspiring event. Everything was awesome from A to Z, well thought out and brilliantly executed by Dr. Selena T. Rodgers.

I have worked for the Social Work Program at York College for seven years this past January, and while I am very familiar with the program itself, I am less familiar with the workings of the field education portion that is headed by Dr. Rodgers. I am very happy that I was able to be a part of this

memorable event. It has given me insight to help me transition into the MSW program at Stony Brook University in fall 2012.

The event held an air of family. It was wonderful to see how connected the students were to their field supervisors, as well as the love returned by the supervisors; but what stuck out the most to me was the speeches given during the main event. The main part of the event started off with a beautiful PowerPoint presentation of all the things the social work students had been a part of, accompanied by the soulful and melodic voice of Prophetess Elder Tasha Sharron Baston. Dr. Alma Norment, the keynote speaker, who is a pioneer of the program and the Field Education component of the program, gave a riveting account of how the program and field education progressed and her road here to York college. She touched on the good and challenging times of the program and how it rose above the problems to solidify itself in the college.

The most important part of the Brunch was rendered by "Remarks from the Field". Br. Philip Rofrano, LCSW-R spoke about being entrusted to teach students his expertise; doing your best as a field supervisor to teach the intern what you know best. He also spoke about putting forth effort to meet the requirements to receive funding. If the funding is not there, these programs will fall apart.

Ms. Sherba Austin, LCSW, spoke about hiring 3 of the BSW interns that were placed with her from the Social Work Program here at York. She made a point of mentioning mentorship. Since hiring the 3 interns 2 have gone on to become MSW's and the third is on her way. Ms. Austin also spoke about the level of work these BSW students are producing and was pleased to compare them without hesitation to her master's level interns. Ms. Austin made a great point in advocating for a master's program at York College. She stated that if we are turning out the prime level of students on the BSW level; imagine what we could do with an MSW Program here at York. Many were in agreement!

Marcia Edwards-Spencer, LMSW spoke next. She holds a unique prospective and it was very interesting to hear her speak on the subject. Mrs. Edwards-Spencer is a long standing adjunct here at York College who teaches our Introduction to Social Work course, Generalist Social Work Practice I and Skills Laboratory level courses and most importantly our field education seminars. Besides all of that, she has also supervised students in the past when she worked for various agencies. Mrs. Edwards-Spencer also advocated for a master's program here at York College by stating the importance of the education the students receive in the field and how it impacts their careers. She also stressed the importance of the field education program as a larger number of students are being placed yearly on the master's level alone. The fact that these agencies are taking BSW students is appreciated.

York College Alumnae, Jaime Rivas-Williams, MSW who graduated the previous Sunday with her MSW from Fordham University; and her speech still echoes in my head as I write this reflection. During her time here, Jaime was very active in the Social Work Club and mentoring her fellow students. Jaime always asked questions and made sure she was on target with her academic goals and on target for graduation. Jaime spoke about the family atmosphere here at York and most importantly praised the Social Work program for the foundation she received and the preparation for her studies at Fordham. She stressed the importance of giving back to the college, the community and leaving a "legacy" to future students. Jaime also told the story of a friend who completed his associates at Kingsborough Community College and was looking for a college to further his education. Not only did she encourage him to come to York, but she followed through with making sure he contacted me and helped him settle in. The student that Jaime referred loves it here at York and is following in Jaime's footsteps to becoming another star in the profession. He is very active in the Social Work Club; like Jaime he is invested in being a part of the Social Work legacy.

I found the whole program very inspiring. I will never forget what I heard or the love, devotion and dedication displayed. It was an honor to have been invited.





Action Day to Albany, NY. Students have engaged in full day meetings with NYS Assembly, Senate members, and their senior staff. On several occasions, students have joined with York's President Marcia Keizs and Director of Government and Community Relations, Earl Simmons.

Audents have advocated advancing the legislative agenda of New York State Social Work Education, the National Association of Social Workers, and York College/CUNY. Examples of the human rights and social and economic justice issues have included: Anti-Cyber Bullying Bill to prohibit bullying and cyber-bullying on school property, (2) Dignity for ALL Students Act to amend the New York Education Law to prohibit bullying and harassment, (3) DREAM Act to allow current, former, and future undocumented high-school graduates and GED recipients a pathway to U.S. citizenship through college or the armed services, (4) Higher Education for Public Assistance Recipients to allow Higher Education to meet TANF work requirements by permitting attendance in up to four years of post-secondary education to count toward, an individual's public assistance employment requirement and resource exemptions for monies set aside for paying for education, (5) Juvenile Justice Reform and Reinvestment in Community-based services to youth and families to improve services to children and help prevent youth crime by closing juvenile detention facilities in NY and replace them with alternatives to detention programs that focus on empowerment - counseling, education and therapy, (6) Safe Harbor Act to provide housing, legal, educational, and other services for commercially sexually exploited youth, and (7) Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) to eliminate the proposed \$75 reduction in TAP awards to students. Students have also lobbied for reinstatement of funding for childcare centers CUNY-wide and funding for York College Academic Village/Conference Center.



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#### The Seoul Connection: Korea Association of Social Workers

On November 8, 2011, Dr. Selena T. Rodgers, Assistant Professor of Social Work, at York College of The City University of New York, was invited to serve as the United States representative at the *Meeting the Challenge of Social Service Delivery International Symposium* in Seoul, South Korea. The Symposium was coorganized by Gyeonggi Welfare Foundation and Korea Institute for Health and Social Affairs as an urgent call to the United States, Korea, Japan, New Zealand, and Sweden to offer recommendations to improve the social welfare system in Korea.

During her stay in South Korea, she was invited by the Korea Association of Social Workers (KASW) President Sung-Chul Cho to visit with him. President Cho and Dr. Rodgers – social workers with a passion for the profession – exchanged information about social work roles at the national and international levels, the need to expand diversity of social work fields and titles, licensing for social workers, and social work field education. They also discussed possible opportunities to host President Sung-Chul Cho for a visit to the United States. Korea Association of Social Workers boasts a membership of over 60,000 throughout Korea. As per the York College Office of Institutional Research and Assessment, 36 students identified themselves as being from South Korea in the Fall 2011 semester. York College of the City University of New York which is located in Queens County is the most ethnically diverse borough in the nation.

Professor Rodgers was also invited by President Sung-Chul Cho to address slightly more than 50 Chongam University social work students. She talked with the students about domestic and global roles of social workers, the charge to help individuals move towards well-being, her passion for social work, and York College Social Work students' field education internship experiences. The international social work students enthusiastically thanked Professor Rodgers for her presentation. Translation was provided by KASW Manager, Soo-Jung Kim (seen in above photos).

Dr. Rodgers shared highlights from her trip abroad with the students enrolled in *Introduction to Social Work* and *Social Research Methods* courses. She also offered the following recommendations: (1) Embrace every experience as a learning opportunity, (2) Prepare your professional agenda with a long-term purpose in mind, (3) Connect course readings and assignments with professional experiences, and (4) Read about national and global trends, cultures and traditions.

In sum, Dr. Rodgers described her three-day stay in Seoul, Korea as a breath-taking, cross-cultural experience filled with progressive discussions about the discourse of Korea's social welfare system, zealous hospitality and accommodations, and authentic Korean cuisine.

#### Dr. Susan Letteney Co-Author's Global HIV Policy



Dr. Susan Letteney, Professor of Social Work at York College of the City University of New York, recently co-authored the *Guideline* 

on HIV Disclosure Counseling for Children up to 12 Years of Age, which was commissioned and published by the World Health Organization in December, 2011. She has been conducting studies and publishing articles on HIV disclosure for the past 14 years. This social problem emerged from her social work practice with HIV positive mothers during a time when children were orphaned and placed in foster care because of a parent's death from HIV or AIDS.



Disclosure of HIV status is an important part of the process of living with HIV, and is crucial to continuum of HIV care. Disclosure decisions are particularly complex when children are involved because of concern about children's emotional ability to understand and cope with the nature of the illness, stigma, family relations and concerns about social support. Caregivers and social workers are often uncertain about when, if and how to disclose, and opportunities to help families start the discussion about living with HIV are often missed.

Until now social workers and other health care workers have had no policies to inform them on the benefits or limitations to children on HIV disclosure. Clinicians now have official guidance for healthcare workers on how to support children 12 years of age and younger and their caregivers, on disclosure of HIV status. The guidance is intended as part of a comprehensive approach to the physical, emotional, cognitive and social well-being of a developing child following the child's own diagnosis of HIV or that of a parent or close caregiver. The report is based on empirical evidence of HIV disclosure to children. It will be distributed worldwide by WHO. 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



Dr. Rodgers was appointed as the new Director of Field Education in Fall 2010. She is an Assistant Professor of Social Work at York College, School of Health and Behavioral Sciences. Her research interests include posttraumatic growth with adults of African ancestry who have been sexually abused as children, immigrants and vicarious trauma in undergraduate social work students. She teaches Social Research Methods II and the Social Work Practice seminar I and II. She has taught at York College, The City University of New York in the Social Work Program since 2002.

The Field Education Office is responsible for the overall administration of the field practicum which ultimately ensures that students are provided with a valuable learning experience. The Council on Social Work Education (2008) asserts that field education is the "signature pedagogy" of social work education. Field education represents the central form of instruction and learning in which a profession socializes its students to perform the role of practitioner (CSWE, 2008). Dr. Rodgers, in collaboration with social work faculty members, developed the "Field Education Student Agreement" (FESA) which delineates York Social Work Program's expectations for professional performance of students in field practicum. A copy of the FESA can be found within student field placement packets. On December 9, 2010, 42 students attended the field orientation meeting and signed the FESA.

The "Social Work Field Education E-Letter" was established in December 2010 to share relevant information about field education, York's Social Work Program and trends in the Social Work profession. The E-letter is issued bi-annually to a cadre of seasoned social workers who are the heart of the York field education program.

The success of the field office is a reflection of the dedicated practicum students, seminar instructors, social work field faculty supervisors, community agencies and the field education advisory council. Thank you for extending yourself and taking the time to mentor our students. We value your participation at the supervisory field education meetings held at York. Trends in the Field

On November 17, 2010, the Field Education Advisory Council discussed several trends in the Social Work profession, including the need for comprehensive services for the elderly, transgender and adolescent populations and for Veterans returning from compact experiences. During the Fall 2010 semester, 16 students successfully completed the "Writing in the Field Workshop" developed and facilitated by Dr. Bonnie Oglensky. These hands-on workshops focus on psychosocial assessment and clinical documentation in social work practice. The goal is to help students improve their knowledge and skills in assessment writing and become familiar with the conventions and expectations of agency-based, professional social work practice. Since its inception in 2007, roughly 100 students have received certificates of completion.
