Greetings from the College's Chief Librarian



It is hard to believe that another academic year has finished at York. During the Summer, the Library Faculty and Staff will be working on several projects that will hopefully improve access to our collections.

Some recent improvements to the Library's public areas include the purchase of 50 more green soft "Ally" chairs, which most students seem to enjoy. As I write this, staff from the Information Technology Department are in the midst of installing 20 new Mac computers in the Library, which should give users more options for their computing needs. To meet the curriculum and research needs of York students and faculty, we ordered approximately \$75,000 worth of new books during the Spring. Be sure to come in and use them! We have also recently installed new alphanumeric touch terminals on the Library's photocopy

machines, which now permit students to use their free Lab printing accounts to make

copies in the Library.

I was honored and humbled to be appointed by President Keizs in January as the seventh Chief Librarian in York's 42-year history. Although I am now in my 14th year as a Library Faculty member at York, I continue to be inspired and energized by our students, and consider it a privilege to work with the Library Faculty and Staff who do such a wonderful job everyday, all year long.

Library's High School Librarian Wins Grants

Ms. Christina Miller received the 2009 We the People "Picturing America" Bookshelf grant awarded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) in cooperation with the American Library Association. This grant provided Queens High School for the Sciences at York College and York Early College Academy with 22 books and supplementary educational materials such as bookplates, bookmarks, posters, and teacher's guides (see photo on page 4). Also, Ms. Miller has been selected to attend one of the NEH's Landmarks of American History and Culture workshops and will receive a stipend to cover living expenses, books, and travel costs to and from Cleveland, Ohio.

York College Library cooperates with other academic departments to develop its specialized reference collection. The Physician Assistant Program, chaired and directed by Dr. Robert Brugna, provided the Library with five thousand dollars to update supplementary texts and other reference books primarily for use by Physician Assistant students. The Library additionally purchased reference and circulating titles to supplement nursing and other health professions' collections. Many of these titles will be helpful to students in general education courses as well. As the college expands its academic programs in allied health and

other areas, the Library greatly appreciates financial assistance from academic departments in order to meet students' needs.

DVDs In the Library

Books are not the only materials available to York College Library users. The Library recently began purchasing DVDs and cataloging them; that means that DVDs show up in the CUNY+ library catalog. Browse our up-and-coming collection by selecting *Call Number* from the search options

and typing "DVD" in the search box.

The Library has collected and lent out VHS video recordings for many years. Currently VHS titles can be browsed remotely via an Excel spreadsheet (link on the Library's webpage) or in person via a notebook of our holdings. Eventually the library catalog will contain both VHS and DVD titles.

Library Technology Upgraded

York College Library is proud to announce that all its PCs were upgraded. Library users now have access to Microsoft Office 2007, which includes Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. Other software upgrades, such as CutePDF, allow students to create professional-quality documents.

Library computers are reserved for York College students, faculty and staff except for eight guest workstations, including one designated ADA station. As of March 30, 2009 all library computers require personal student or faculty log-in. By signing in with individual username and password, students have access to secure server space to save their documents. If unable to sign in to the computer, please visit the IT Help Desk at 2E03.

Please note that this username/password will also provide you with fifty dollars of printing as well as complete access to library databases from



home via your VPN account.

Explore CUNY+

This is a continuation of the series that began in the last issue of *Password*. The previous article offered tips to maximize book searches. This article addresses other features of the CUNY+ Online Catalog.

Journal Title Search

CUNY+ is more than a book catalog. For example, you can search periodical titles by using *Journal Title Search*. Despite the wording, *Journal Title Search* displays results for magazines,

newspapers, and other serials available in paper, microform, and/or electronic format. *Journal Title Search* retrieves serial titles only, not individual articles. York's print and microform holdings are also listed in binders available throughout the Library.

In York Library's Information Literacy classroom, students of Queens High School for the Sciences at York College (QHSS) learned to use Boolean operators and truncation to better search the Library's online catalog, databases and e-books. Students also learned to evaluate websites, use Google's Advanced Search, and differentiate a popular magazine from a journal. These sessions help students complete their assignments as well as

prepare for college work.

Information Literacy Update

York's librarians are dedicated to helping students, faculty, and administrators do better research. Librarians teach information literacy skills during one-on-one sessions and in classes. According to faculty, students who have received library instruction turn in higher quality assignments after the class. Students also report that information literacy classes are helpful in completing assignments. Librarians teach information literacy skills in classes, during faculty development workshops, and in sessions tailored for students with disabilities. During the 2008-2009 academic year, York librarians taught 113 information literacy sessions. As head of the information literacy program at York it is my hope that we will increase the number of classes in the 2009-2010 academic year.
