

#### Setting

After a ten year siege, the Greeks defeated the Trojans. They built a huge, hollow, wooden horse, then pretended to sail their boats away from Troy. The Trojans took the wooden horse inside the gates of the city. That night, the Greek soldiers who were hidden inside the horse, came out, let the rest of their army into the city and destroyed it.

This scene is in a ruined courtyard of what is left of Troy.

In this earliest of Anti-War plays, Euripides focuses on the losing side. The Trojan women and children are the only survivors of the massacre that occurred when Troy fell to the Greeks. That the women were taken as slaves by the victorious side was simply a part of the spoils of war. However, Euripides makes it clear that the killing of Hector's infant son was a barbaric act not worthy of Athenian Ethos and he emphasizes this in Andramache's speech.

The play takes place at the foot of and on the steps of the Acropolis in Athens.

James Come (Professor of Speech Communication) came to York in 1968, when he founded the speech discipline. He chaired the Department of Performing and Fine Arts for 15 years. He holds a Ph.D. degree in Language, Literature and Communication from Columbia University. At York, he has appeared in *The Madwoman of Chaillot* (directed by Barbara Nickolich). His newest book is *Branches to Heaven: The Geniuses of C.S. Lewis*.

Timothy J. Amrhein (Assistant Professor of Theatre Design) holds an MFA from Wayne State University. He has designed sets and costumes for various productions throughout the United States, and most recently: Twelfth Night, and The Merry Widow. Some of Mr. Amrhein's past work includes the first New York City revival of The Full Monty, The Fantasticks, and Yeoman of The Guard. He has designed at the Princeton Rep Shakespeare Festival, The River Rep Theatre, The Wings Theatre, and Montclair State University. Mr. Amrhein has also designed for The Second City Comedy Group; Carnegie Mellon University; the University of Pittsburgh, and the California Repertory Theatre. He has received the Best Scenic Design award from the NJ Star Ledger for his production of The Merry Wives of Windsor and the Detroit Free Press's Theatre Excellence Award for Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Scapin. Mr. Amrhein is a member of United Scenic Artists (USA) Local 829 and the United States Institute of Theatre Technology (USITT).

Barbara Nickolich (Professor of Theatre) received her formal theatre training from Wheaton College, Northwestern University and New York University. In addition, she has been a student of Bobby Troka, voice coach, in New York City. She has appeared as a performer and director with the CUNY Readers Theatre. She developed a one-woman show, American Counterpoint, which she performed in Munich, Germany, Nashville and New York City. Most of her work has been as a director of legitimate theatre in university settings. Antigone, Tartuffe, Six Plays by Dario Fo, Callalio 7, The Miser, Camino Real, The Imaginary Invalid, Galileo, Callaloo 8, A Servant of Two Masters, Callaloo 9, Endgame, Callaloo 10, and The Glass Menagerie have been her most recent productions.

Sarah Schilling (Associate Professor of Theatre) received her training at Western Reserve University and the Cleveland Playhouse. After graduation, she joined a professional acting company in Erie, PA and played summer stock in Wisconsin. Upon arriving in New York City, she performed for over a year in the role of Heloise in a play by the same name at the Off Broadway Gate Theatre. While teaching, first at Packer Collegiate Institute and then at York, she worked as one of the directors at the Off-Off-Broadway Actor's Place Theatre at St. Luke's in the West Village. She has appeared in Samuel Beckett's Cascando at LaMaMa and as a Guide in the Off-Off Broadway production: A Woman's Work is Never Done.

Bob Barnes (CLT, Theatre Technical Director) spent many years touring throughout Europe and the United States, working with companies such as the Atlanta Contemporary Dance Company, The Puerto Rican Traveling Theatre, and The Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble. Mr. Barnes is a member of Actors Equity and has performed under the direction of Word Baker, Howard DaSilva, and Marshall Mason of the Circle Rep.
